## Article Summary

There are several factors giving rise to the exponential increase of Bangladeshi students studying in China. China's rapid economic ascent with its high profile international business expansion, the strong bilateral trade ties between Bangladesh and China, and the consolidating diplomatic relations between the two nations are some of the important criteria behind the increasing rise of interest among Bangladeshi students to come and study here. Broadly speaking there are two categories of students: one who are self-financed and the other are awarded either partial/full scholarship. The latter is much sought-after, since for instance out of 100 undergraduate aspirants only a selected few get accepted, at a varying ratio of 1:25. Based on empirical evidence there are other type of educational grants from Chinese Scholarship Council besides the undergraduate program; they are Graduate program, PhD, and Chinese Diploma course.

Almost all the Bangladeshi candidates first must touchdown Beijing and then relocated immediately to locations mentioned in your "Offer Letter", which was handed down by Chinese Embassy in Bangladesh.

Once you have settled down to your assigned *Chinese university* and allocated the chosen program. I am sure you will be spending a long time gaining knowledge about China and in time come to appreciate China's high-quality education system. This entire article covers various

facets of student life and entry level professional path in China.

### What you will get here:

In here you will find a brief glimpse of the general student life in China and ways to best cope with a new education system and absolutely dissimilar environment. In addition, I have briefly documented the salient points on the general education lifecycle of Bangladeshi students in China beginning from Elementary Chinese courses. Furthermore after graduation I have offered some advices to your professional career paths.

Finally I've encouraged you to be always proactive in making decisions and choices and take measures to become successful. A sample guide will help you define your professional and academic life- so that you can have more room to control your goals and aspirations.

## 1. *What is global opportunity?*

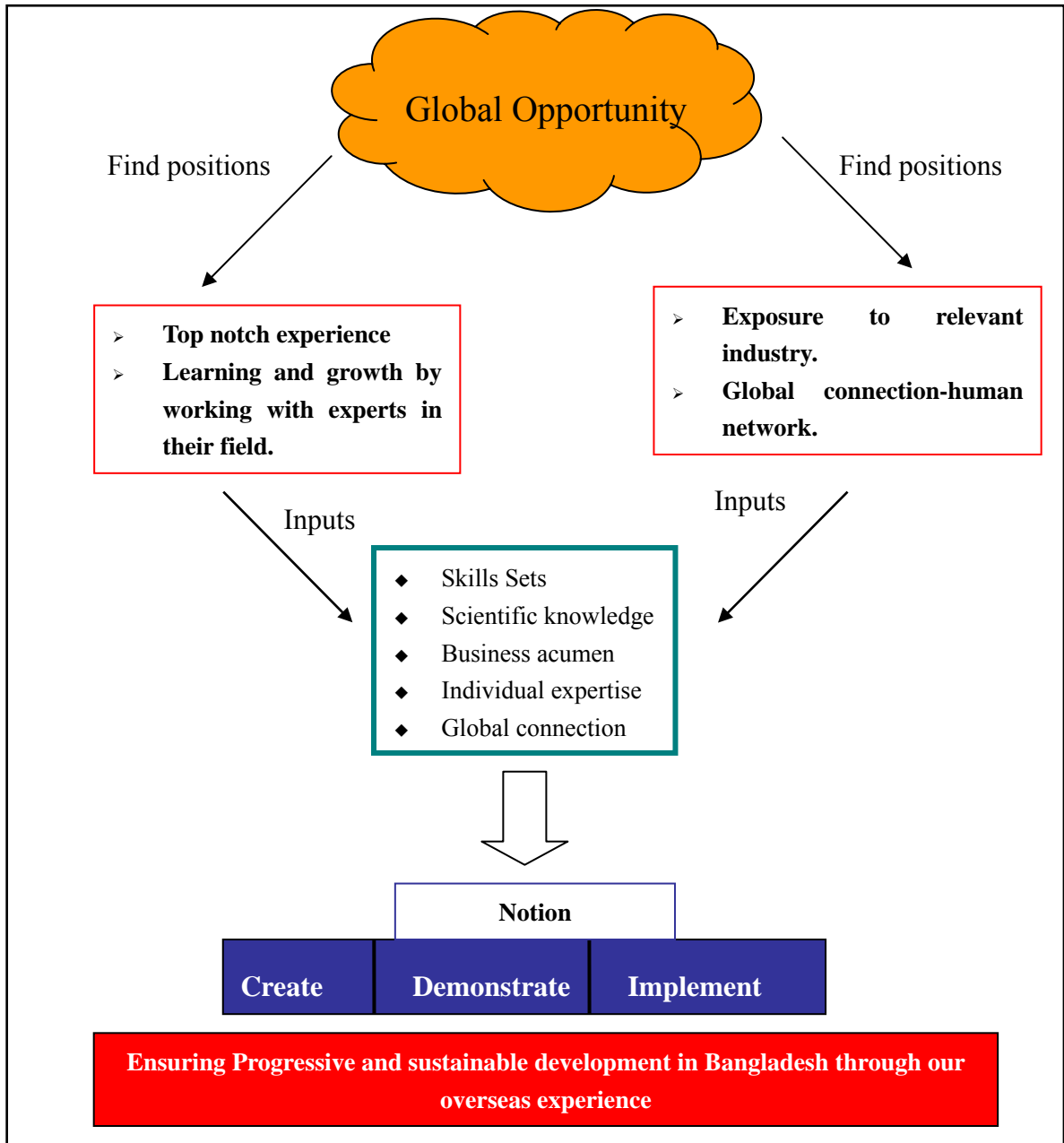

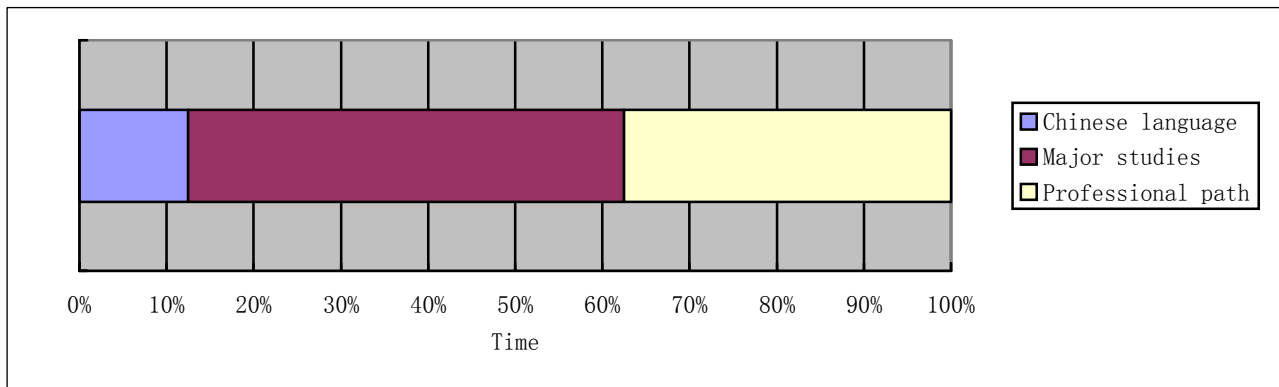

### Four keys to success

**First Key:**



#### **Elementary Education and Growth:**

The primary phase is to break the language barrier. For first timers it is very difficult to communicate fluently in Chinese language without uttering a word or two in English, unless you took prior Chinese courses in Bangladesh. In most cases you will have some form of difficulty to communicate with your surroundings. Surprisingly, over here

attempting to ensue any informal English conversation with the locals usually with teenagers and adults (possessing appreciable education background) are seen as a welcome since it offers your counterpart a ripe opportunity to practice English with you. However long term wise, I am not encouraging you to mingle at a point where English only is seen by your Chinese friend as a comparative advantage. If you really need to improve English and that's your secondary intention try to befriend some European or even better American classmates. I will soon get down to those points later.

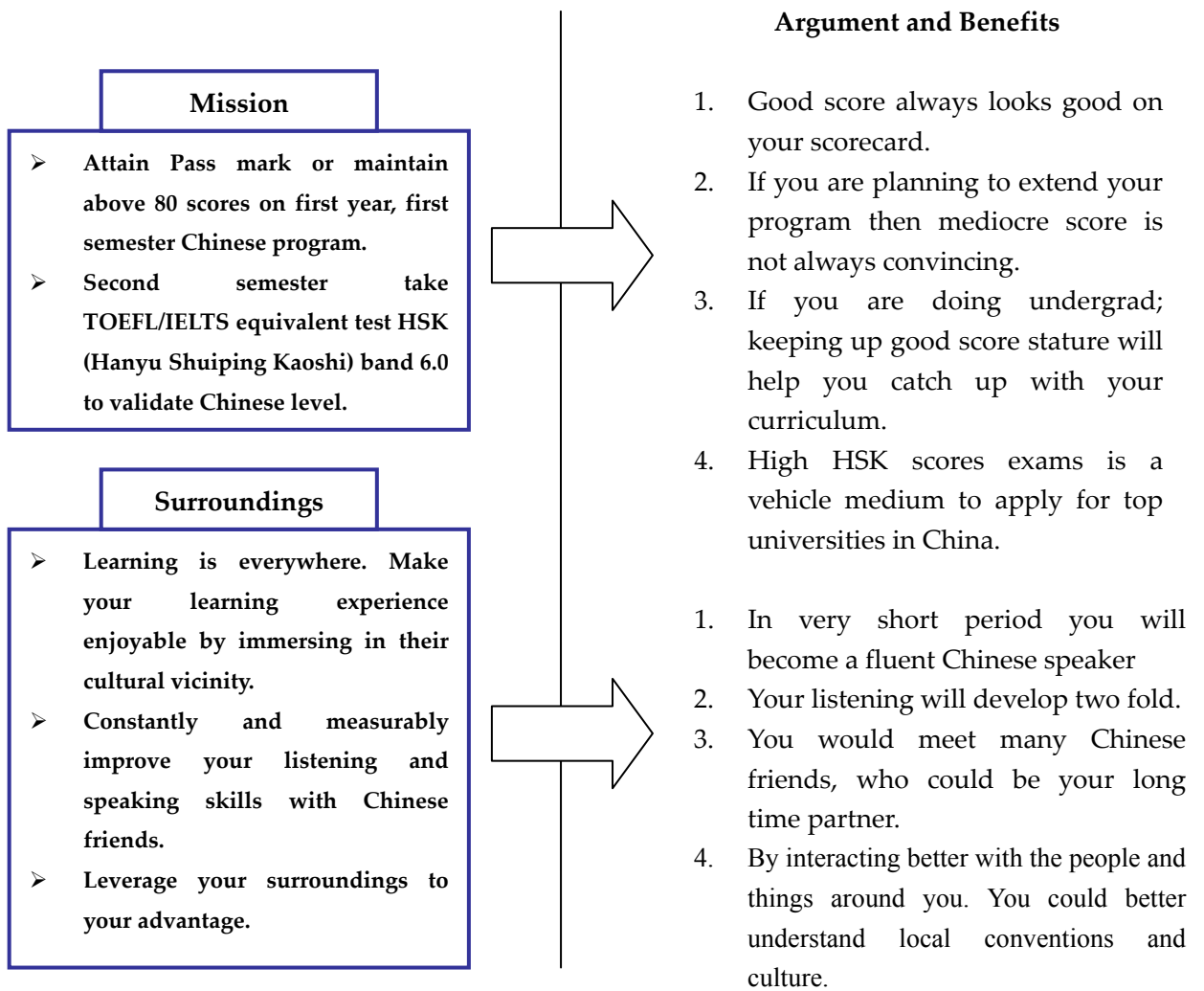
Now let us get back to the Chinese Language program, which your assigned *Chinese university* will be taking care of. The *Chinese University* will be fully responsible to foster your Chinese language capability by offering you a one year beginner's level Chinese course in this aspect. The course will start probably in mid-August (Fall Session) and end same time the following year. Almost all of the major universities (by major I mean universities located in or around major cities) have in place some kind of elementary Chinese level course for foreigners. Unless otherwise stated in the "Offer Letter", you may have to spend one year outside your assigned *Chinese university*. It is noteworthy to mention as for learning any new languages it is always very difficult the beginning and Chinese is no exception. Thus I encourage you to put in all-out-effort to overcome the steep learning curve, which means in short time you need to consume a lot of Chinese characters, vocabularies and basic grammar structures. I have given a simple guide on how to overcome some of the learning difficulties (considering what you are studying; your investment on time and effort in Chinese language from the very beginning will pay off dividends in terms of Chinese comprehension during university years and career wise):

1. #1 point to put at your subconscious level; provided you are taking a fully Chinese-medium course of studies then start working on it right now! Double Pronto!
2. The day you receive your text books just don't let those books gather dusts on the table, please turn those pages. Spend 2 hours reviewing them and complete 2 chapters a day prior to attending any classes. Make this your second behavior to review and complete the chapters before any classes. In that way you will learn more from the class lectures.
3. Speaking of second behavior try to make a first day habit to constantly practice Chinese Characters on a rough page or on a special square-box gridline paper used for practicing individual characters. It is better to master some techniques for writing characters and the ability to instantly visualize the character by a combination of radicals. To make my point I will draw an analogy between Chinese and English characters. How do you write the English capital letter "N"? Well you first draw a vertical bar from top-bottom like this | and then connect it with a geometrically diagonal line \ lastly you finish off with another vertical bar |. Similarly in Chinese language, characters are constructed by radicals but not like the horizontal bar and the diagonal. Chinese radicals are far from simple geometric lines and they are used to constitute individual compound characters. Ironically

these Chinese radicals have unique names and you must memorize them for the sake of intimately knowing the Chinese characters. Later at the appendix I'll show some examples to make my point clearer.

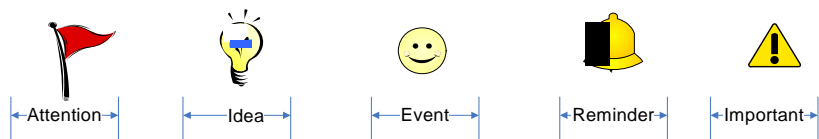
4. During weekdays set aside some time to discover Chinese TV channels. It won't be long before you find your favorite TV channels; allocate minimum 3-4 hours each day. This will improve your listening ability by natural acquisition and I have seen couple of Bangladeshi students who dramatically improved their language skills. During weekends try to watch your favorite Chinese TV program, soap opera or drama series. Keep your mind at constant practice, awareness and alert. Force your mind to exercise listening (percentage of comprehension) and visualize those characters and practice them in your mind (after you have mastered the radical techniques). Be nimble and a flexible learner. By keeping your mind at constant training and practice you could have more attention and therefore retain an astounding 90% of what you are learning.
5. You will spend an average 6 hours in class, 5 days a week learning Chinese language. To be an effective learner take down notes and actively participate and interact with teachers and classmates. During class try to maintain at all times class etiquette: be modest, equally respectful both to your classmates and teachers, show enthusiasm and don't be aggressive, take your time to both respond and ask questions and finally stand up when you need to answer or make any responses in class. Preserving this class etiquette will show the unique qualities among Bangladeshi students.
6. Enrich your social life by mixing with Chinese students. Overall Chinese people are very kind and helpful and ready to assist you on any aspects of your learning stage. Try to speak with them in Chinese and show your interest to make language partners. Language partners are essential during your studies to catapult your Chinese speaking and listening ability to the next level. Work out the time for it and as always be effective learner and enjoy learning.
7. Finally try to make some simple basic schedule like how you allocate time in a week on your program and take special notes on which part of the program you are having most difficult time and ways to mitigate this problem. If you already have a routine based on your day-day activities and lifestyle follow them strictly.

**Afterthought:** Your first year Chinese is very crucial and critical to your Undergraduate or higher studies, provided Chinese is the medium of language. So make sure to tie down your improvement and performance with time. Otherwise you will very soon loose sense of time or spend most of your time sleeping under the blue, I think you know what I mean. Here is an illustration on how you could set critical missions and weigh the benefits of your effort in order to maximize the usage of time.

Weekly Schedule is a routine that helps you plan out your days in a week. Use the empty template to fill-in your morning and evening fixed activities and assignments. Instituting your regular life will bring in more structure to your lifestyle and set definition to regular activities. So sit down, do some planning and work it out. Try to follow it strictly after that.

In every routine building there is always some motive of what you shall achieve in a certain time frame. Shown below is a monthly task target broken down in weeks. In here goals and objectives that you want to achieve are called tasks. A task should be defined in simple language say for example in a week I will memorize 70 Chinese vocabularies. Hence you set your routine to memorize 10 words everyday, put it down in your Weekly schedule (when you will allocate time and do it). And on the monthly task target set your start and finish time.

Weekly schedule helps you plan out your regular days while monthly task give you the big picture of what you should achieve in certain time frame.

### Summary

In our first success key I have described some methods to pick up Chinese language quickly and effectively. Eventually you need to find your own method of learning and ways to capture the knowledge taught at Chinese classes. Your learning rhythm must match the Chinese classes' pace otherwise you will risk falling far behind. Besides the regular Chinese classroom sitting, you could find inspiring moments by immersing yourself with the surroundings and things around you. Look at the billboard and see how much you can read, hear local folks holding an impromptu conversation right in front of you; Comprehend! Comprehend! Send Chinese text message to your friend; take time to carefully read what's written on the signpost at the sidewalk. There are so many situations you can draw from your surroundings; just prepare and relax to constantly interact and breath, visualize and draw in your vast mind the characters and later you will come to realize that learning happens everywhere.

To be an effective learner you must push the boundaries of your capabilities to the limit, I am sure you will have a fruitful effort in the end. Besides effort you need to maximize your time utilization through schedules and timetable. In order to maximize your time you need to first set missions and ask yourself what the benefits are to achieve those missions. A mission setting will enhance you to maximize your time and gradually achieve your objectives you have set. You could fill-in the blank "weekly schedule plan" and "monthly task target" templates and once you have completed make sure you see them and keep them close at views length.

## Second Key:

### **Obtain more information on university curriculum and get the best out of them**

After successfully completing the Elementary Chinese Diploma Course/Program, we will move to another important topic of your overseas education- that is your Major studies. To state the least it is the pre-final hurdle and I must caution you that there are many insurmountable obstacles and the high possibility of failure. Any miscalculations during your studies could trigger a ripple effect to your career plan and throw you off the target. In short the cornerstone of your major success lies in the major studies or research work you are conducting. I know it sounds very obvious, most often than not, this is ignored. Anyone could easily go astray and end up taking two steps forward and two steps backward and going nowhere like the polka dance. You need to be clear headed and focus on finishing what you came for and make sure that you learn and grow professionally from your program. At this stage it takes a lot of determination, super patience, passion and extreme diligence to overcome one of the major barriers in your growth stage. Be warned that there is no room for the fainthearted.

Allow me to show what lies ahead for the brave ones:

- First, provided the courses are conducted almost in Chinese (Undergraduate program the same applies to Graduate program) then there is no way you can juggle so many subjects with the lightning speed each classes are taught. You are simply clueless from day one of your new program while readjusting yourself to purely Chinese taught classes. In most cases your Chinese level is not up to par as native speakers. As a result before you even realize what's going on around you the mid-term examination appears out of the blue and caught you unaware.
- Secondly, as a foreign student there is no luxury to attend say for example Mathematics or Economics with foreigner only classes. They don't exist and universities would not take the incredible hassle to conduct all courses in English. This only happens on your Chinese language program (Bilingual).
- Thirdly, almost all Chinese professors are bounded by department fixed curriculum, timeframe and schedules. Since the professor must abide by the department fixed rules and regulation they become busy meeting their department objectives and as a consequence poor students becomes the victim.
- Fourth, the subjects taught have somewhat high degree of difficulty in understanding. This is because most of the major Chinese universities have in place a standard for high quality education system albeit not internationally recognized. Even high caliber Chinese students need relentless efforts day and night coping with the university curriculum.
- Fifth, during your educational stint you will always face resource constraints most likely monetary restraints or in some situations busy contemplating how to make ends meet. Beware such kind of constraints will suck your performance and overall efficiency dry.

Prescription and recommendations to overcome five major obstacles.

At this stage you will inevitably collide with amongst unseen obstacles and most predictable problems, make sure you make necessary adjustments in order to strike a balance between education, personal life, and current resource constraints. I know it is very difficult to do that, however you need to prioritize and give commitment according to your present circumstances. This balancing part I will leave to your discretion and good judgment.

### Summary

In here I have explained the nature of obstacles you might face together with prescription and recommendations. Obviously you will approach a lot of other problems not mentioned here; for such cases you need to be patient and level-headed at all times. Be relentless and let your subject professors know that you are a regular student and make professors realize that you attend to his/her every class. Don't show you are unique; be modest, friendly and show an accepting attitude to your Chinese classmates. Proactively engage in activities with them and you will flourish in basic human relationship building and management. This mutual relation will pay off big time.

Maintaining a healthy relationship with your foreign classmates is also very important as you could jointly initiate privately held foreigners' only subject classes with your difficult to understand professors. During breaks tacitly ask for important examinations tips and points from privately held classes.

On monetary constraints my advice is to spend some time Googling or Baidu for local English teaching posts or other tutoring jobs. There are so many websites or community forum offering part-time jobs. If it is not working for you then find innovative ways to earn money. One thing for sure there is no special study-work program arranged by your university. Also see to that you don't spend a large amount of time on teaching and chasing after jobs. Use your time wisely and make appropriate decisions based on priorities of when to set aside time for your part-time duties.

### Third Key:




#### **Simultaneously develop and redesign yourself:**

To ensure you choose the right profession and relevant industry domain you need to invest heavily on your skills and preferences along with time. Begin by training as early as possible. Sit down and analyze your interest and lacking; get a blank sheet of paper and jot down your strengths and weakness, interests and tendencies; finally recheck to see you don't miss out any human qualities and its every nuances you possess. Your entire characteristics are all very important components for accelerated maturity and growth. By gaining more knowledge about yourself you could easily improve on the deficiencies and lacking on skills and expertise that you could face in the near future. See what excites you, which part of the study program clicks in your head.

It was unfortunate for me not to think in a structured way especially during my early undergraduate final years. Luckily, I joined as an intern in a Chinese IT outsourcing corporation. The corporation mainly dealt with exporting lots of computer codes packaged as a service to some of its major American clients. At that time I had no clue about this part of IT industry and its core businesses so I substituted my lacking by becoming a part time English teacher teaching the software engineers. Very soon I became interested about what my huge corporation did and saw its market potential in Bangladesh. From little interest it grew into a fire and then a full fledged drive to know more about this industry. I gradually focused my knowledge gathering to IT outsourcing and all its variants. From that day forward I kept improvising and cementing my lacking at this industry and craved to know more. Early intern program are very important so start your search a year or two ahead. It would definitely help you realize the hidden and latent potential and deficiencies will surface as you go along. Further it would greatly benefit you by taking prior preparations to supplement and consolidate strengths and weakness. Work hard and I guarantee that you will have a smooth transition between graduation and the new job responsibilities assigned.

It is a good sign when you start worrying with moderation about your professional or academic path very early, which shows you are genuinely serious about your future. A good way to kick start this contingency job prep plan is internet. Start searching at various companies or your field of interest for employee requirements or internship opportunities. Look for mid-size employers with the least requirements. In that way you will get a high chance grabbing the internships. Try to read between the lines on job requirements and talk with your professors or senior friends in person, in case you don't understand the industry jargon. The best way is to get in there and start learning; it would definitely mold you and reshape your capabilities. A good sound conceptual litmus test of your present situation is to use benchmarking and capability measurement report card and then set achievable tasks, provided that is your dream job or where you want to be for professional development in the future. Just don't fancy achieving great things, first take small measured achievable steps and gradually hit a home run.

Here are some few simple graphical illustrations on career benchmarking-- some sort of litmus test on your capability. **Remember shown below is a typical case for me, which might not be applicable to your background.** In any case, follow the steps I have enumerated below. First Benchmark, second make a measure capability report card and lastly set achievable task guidelines. After everything is ready make correspondence right away; beginning with a Cover Letter and your Resume. Let them know through your correspondence that you are an ideal candidate for the job advertised.

Achievable scorecard

**Achievable scorecard:** This scorecard pays a particular focus on your weakness and strengths found in the report card and concretely lays out what are the things that could be completed under your capacity and things beyond your capacity. Achievable tasks should exceed not more than five points and see to it that you are achieving every milestones and goals you have set. Don't make it long and gorgeous; target the small achievable tasks and finish it.

**Remember shown below is a typical case for me, which might not be applicable to your background, major and preferences.**

**Afterthought:** On account of beginning a professional life journey most employers are interested to see what added value you would bring to them. Having said that you must improve upon your basic knowledge on whatever domain discipline or preference you are covering and demonstrate confidently that you are an ideal candidate to bring in the added value to the opening positions. Although your south-east Asian background helps gain an upper hand in job search, however, do not rest assured that your language skills (Hindi, Bengali, and English) alone will get you to the top or the chance to ride the wave of global opportunity. You must consolidate and prove your skills and expertise at workplace. Do not rest until you are sure you have achieved what you have planned. Put in your time and effort to be better all the time in what you are doing. Thus you could offer your employer both matching (skills and expertise) and complementary (languages) strengths to cover the tasks they propose.

## Summary

In here I have addressed ways to be proactive by initiating a quantifiable measurement of your capabilities and a proper planning on your improvement trainings well ahead of any professional career development. This must be carried out simultaneously along with your studies in China. On your spare time, download and print out from the internet the employer entry level job requirements. Benchmark and measure whether you could be a suitable candidate for the job. If not, be determined to cement the lacking by training and setting achievable objectives. When you start early time is on your side and better get going and fight till you accomplish your intended goals and objectives. Try to find out your preference or tendency for example competent at Java programming or a natural ability to learn languages or able to carry out large mental computation mathematics/economics. Consolidate them with intense practice and boot-camp training. Finally demonstrate and validate your knowledge by sitting for exams or make certain publications.

Focus is the key here, so do not lose the initiation drive and the passion to achieve. Be proactive! Keep improving and be better everyday.

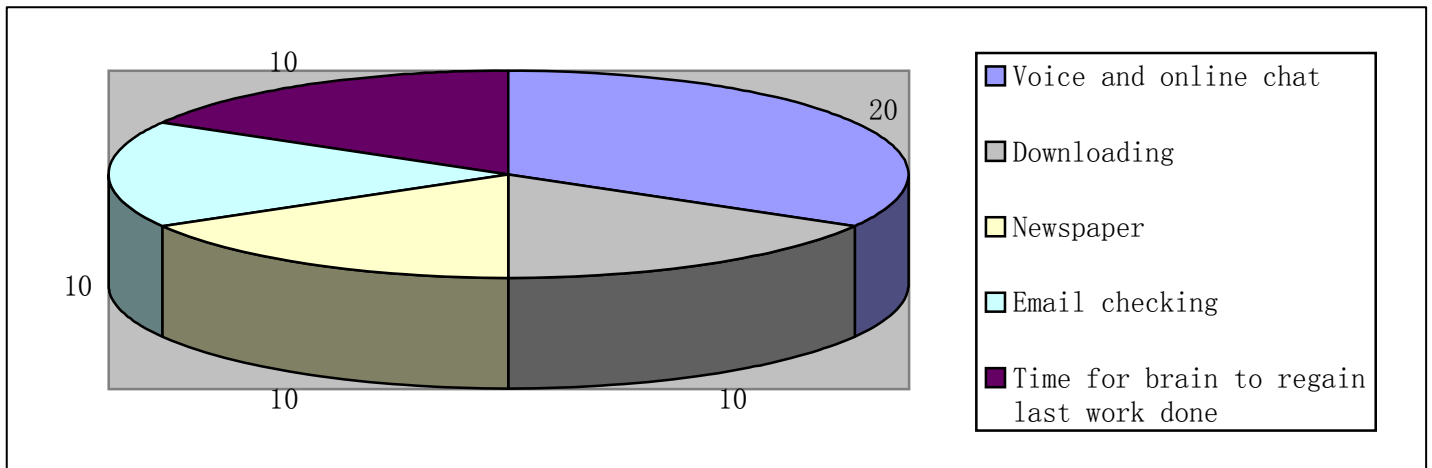
#### **The power of Now:**

Welcome to the flattening world of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. With breathtaking pace of numerous scientific and technological breakthroughs and the power of free market economy the world is becoming increasingly flat. Our long standing view of the spherical shaped world we were once taught during kinder garden is under fire. Geographic distance in miles and territorial borders and regions are now closing and collapsing with just a click of your mouse. We are so lucky to be precisely at this time and to witness in China the dramatic transformation of the world by a virtual force called the internet technology. No longer are we relying on distant stale news traveling around the globe, within seconds stock news, sensitive information and market report are flushed out to our internet browser or fed to the mobile phones and handheld devices. Our lives are interwoven with the wonder of nanotechnologies, robots, and portable laptop computers. The very fabrics of our daily digital activities are passed on online collaboration, research work and the search for intended reliable information. Families and friends are no longer in different locations and geographies. Internet has connected everyone to a platform of interactivity, file sharing and internet telephony, so clear and crisp is the voice quality of VOIP that it is very easy to be mistaken for someone from the other side of your room. I accept the internet has offered more than its share of good things, but let us also argue how it has affected our productivity and efficiency through out our student development stages.

## Argument against Internet on productivity and efficiency

It is very easy to get lost in this virtual flat world and come out gaining nothing at all. There is not one good “help file” to guide you master the power of now. Virtually everywhere you see there is flood of information pretty overwhelming, which might make you sick or cause your head to get overloaded. There is no one simple way to distinguish what is useful information and what is not. For instance from Emule or other bit torrent sites (Mininova) there are numerous resources on say Java Programming. Now you need to be really precise and exact in your search-- what you want to know. Otherwise the site search results will be replete with resources, which are both time consuming to look at and confusing. First be very clear what type of information you require or resources you need. In most cases downloaded files are rarely read. Resources and files saved in one of the hard disk locations will amount nothing to you if it is not thoroughly read and understood, let alone the degree of usefulness to your work. More often we are busy checking so many multiple resources that we end up confused and puzzled. I have found out that I spend most of my work time on multi-tasking: MSN chatting and listening to music. When msn chat window blinks on the taskbar I stop without any inner resistance to say “hi” or “how was the day”. In the end the work I was doing becomes a discontinuous chore of interruption, attending nature calls and lunch breaks. I’ve estimated that we are spending a staggering 60% of our productive hours/day on chatting, checking emails, downloading, reading newspapers and various other idiosyncratic computer activities not related to our job or duties. All this bad work habits are sucking the efficiency out of us and we are no longer productive in completing our work on time. This goes on and on and there’s no time to stop and allocate substantial energy required in mental processing.

Internet has helped me in great number of ways, it actually educated (self-taught) and improved the quality of life. In other words it opened a whole new world to me. So here is just a few juicy benefits I have gained:

1. During my course certification study I signed up for free to some online group study community. There were lots of eager and high caliber members in the forum who diligently shared exam tips, insights, collaborated and exchanged different issues across the syllabus. Things that I don't understand I always posted questions on the forum and within days I get the whole community answering the questions. I became an active member and help other new community members in their difficulties.
2. Online social networking (Facebook) and professional networking (LinkedIn or we@link) has swelled my outlook express address book into an army of virtual human capital. From engineers to doctors, Harvard alumni to Common wealth country scholars, CEO to software engineers, classmates to former students; the array of acquainted people are so vast, it's actually really amazing. In fact I quite often use my virtual connection to leverage or solicit insights and information to my advantage. Prominent and popular social and professional networking platform offers access to millions of people, all at your reach, with fast and reliable search you could get connected to desired groups or individual person in seconds.
3. Popular file sharing program offers abundant latest resources (all 2006 publications) in digital format. It is knowledge bonanza to learners and researchers alike. Resources and latest files have improved upon my maturity and took me to the next level of human intellect. I owe to the copy left advocates and the open source community for making everything- that is each and every bit of knowledge public.
4. At my work place various software and Microsoft office suite boosted my productivity and efficiency. It takes time to learn, but once you are done I am sure you will become highly capable to express eloquently your ideas and concepts without ever worrying how I should do it.
